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Description



Bagno Vignoni is an ancient and famous spa village, located within the Val d'Orcia Natural Artistic Park. Its thermal waters have been used since Roman times thanks to the proximity of the Via Francigena, the road for pilgrims heading to Rome. The main attraction of the village is the Piazza delle Sorgenti, the place where the first houses began to rise, later accompanied by inns and the church dedicated to St. John the Baptist.

The square takes its name from the large pool in the center which, with its colored waters and vapors, creates an evocative and surprising scenario, further embellished by the Renaissance buildings that surround it. Walking in this square, immersed in its fairytale atmosphere, is like taking a leap into the past. Bagno Vignoni is in fact rich in history: it was a famous destination among noble families, such as the Medici, but also

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among the popes: the most important was Pope Pius II, who owned a summer residence right in the square.

To be remembered in particular the stay of Catherine of Siena, who bathed where the water was warmer as a sign of penance and to whom the loggia that runs along one side of the main pool is dedicated. Caterina was in Bagno from 1362 to 1367 and probably returned there in 1377.

From the square flows the water that flows into the river of the Parco dei Mulini, an area characterized by rivulets and waterfalls but above all by the four mills built around the twelfth century. They are very unique as they were usable even in summer thanks to the constant flow of water from the thermal spring. The Park is free to access but a recent ordinance of the mayor prohibits bathing in the pools in the area.

In the Middle Ages Bagno Vignoni enjoyed great fame and illustrious personalities came to be cured with its waters. In addition to Catherine of Siena, Lorenzo the Magnificent and Pope Pius II Piccolomini also wrote about it in their notebooks, while the travelers of the Grand Tour wrote about it frequently in their notebooks. The suggestion of the vapors and fumes of its waters were the inspiration for the scene of the masterpiece film by Andrej Tarkosvskij who shot here at the end of the 70s the film entitled "Nostalghia".

Description of the itinerary

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The itinerary starts from the main car park, located a short distance from the entrance to the village. From the parking lot, proceed on foot in the direction **of Parco dei Mulini**.

You walk along a small raised square from street level, until you meet the entrance to the "Hotel Posta Marcucci" accommodation facility. From here, an up and down of the sidewalk allows you to reach the square from where it is possible to observe some areas of the Parco dei Mulini, an important archaeological and natural area since 1997.

Bagno Vignoni was one of the most productive centers in the area, abandoned with the whole system of mills in the 50s of the twentieth century. These infrastructures, thanks to the supply of thermal waters, worked 12 months a year. The construction of a milling center with 4 mills placed in sequence along the cliff stood out for the use of thermal water captured by a canalization system directly at the spring basin and for the largely underground morphology with rooms dug into the travertine cliff. Formed by the carbonate deposits of the thermal water, the exploitation of the thermal spring, with its abundant and constant flow, allowed grinding even in summer when most of the mills were inactive due to the low flow of the rivers.

From the square it is quite visible how it was organized in the past, the ancient complex characterized by gorge, mills and the ancient tower.



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Accessibility:

The stretch of road from the parking lot to the entrance of the village has a regular and flat pavement.

The path runs along a small raised square, with respect to the road surface, about 21 cm high.

A little further on, in front of the entrance to the accommodation "Hotel Posta Marcucci", a small ramp allows us to enter the square. The ramp has a width of 140 cm, a length of 230 cm and a slope of 7%. The ramp has no handrails on the sides.

The two large basins entirely dug into the travertine and communicating with each other through a slit fed the mill by means of an inverted cone-shaped conduit that narrowed to obtain a high-pressure jet directed at the driving wheels of the mill. A gravel path, not recommended for people with disabilities, allows you to see the pools more closely, which are also clearly visible from the terrace

From the entrance to the path, on the left side there is a small beaten gravel path that leads to a ramp not recommended for people with disabilities. The ramp directs us towards a gravel path that allows us to see the pools more closely, which are also clearly visible from the terrace.

Accessibility:

The beaten gravel path has an external entrance step of 3 cm and an internal entrance step of 7 cm that leads us to a ramp that has irregularities and pebbles and therefore not recommended for people with disabilities.

On the side of the hotel there is another ramp that allows us to see the area from the side. From here starts a partly irregular beaten gravel path that leads us to the back of the park from where you can admire the view and part of the buildings that formed the complex including the tower.

Accessibility:

On the side of the hotel there is another asphalt ramp 5 meters long with a slope of 5% and on asphalt pavement that allows us to see the area from the side.

The area, inside, is not accessible to people with motor disabilities due to the presence of obstacles (stones, stones, steps, depressions).

From the Park, continue towards Via del Gorello until you reach **Piazza del Moretto** where the old building of the **thermal establishment is located**. Beyond the building, after a few meters on our right, we find the entrance **to the ancient loggia, with the thermal bath** and symbol of the place. Inside the pool flows the natural spring of thermal water which, after traveling a stretch underground, re-emerges in the gorelli of the Parco dei Mulini. The pool is characterized by a loggia and is rectangular in shape. It measures 49 meters long and 29 meters wide, and has a jet of thermal water, which once gushed

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out at a temperature of 52 degrees. The basin is of sixteenth-century origin and is characteristic for its hot and steaming waters that come out of the underground aquifer of volcanic origin. Since 1170, the waters with healing properties have also been used for balneo, mud and therapeutic treatments, as they are rich in precious minerals such as carbonates, sulphates, calcium and magnesium.

Inside the loggia there is a **chapel**, worthy of interest and dedicated to Santa Caterina who stayed here between 1362 and 1367 like many other illustrious guests: Lorenzo the Magnificent and Pope Pius II Piccolomini. Right inside this small and simple place of worship, the Sienese saint prayed every day, during her stays. Today the Chapel, closed by a wrought iron door, is still clearly visible from the outside. A building of limited area, it has a small altar and an image of the Saint, affixed to the center of the wall.

Accessibility:

From the Mulino park to the entrance of the loggia, the pavement in stone blocks is free of obstacles.

The entrance to the loggia has a passage 116 cm wide and 1 small step about 4 cm high.

To continue the route, go back towards the entrance to the loggia where a few meters on the left side you will find the **Church of San Giovanni Battista**. The church was built between the twelfth and thirteenth centuries in the Romanesque era. The façade is gabled, plastered with a portal and brick windows. Inside , a large central corridor on smooth pavement allows you to visit the simple church with a single nave.

On the right wall a sacred image is framed by a Della Robbia, it is a work in polychrome glazed terracotta and with plant elements. Frames of this kind are one of the typical products of the Della Robbia workshop, since the time of the mature activity of the progenitor Luca. Further on a painting of the Sienese school of the eighteenth century representing Santa Caterina da Siena with the village in the background and a fresco of the '600 of the Risen Christ which in the beginning was located in the small chapel overlooking the basin. The interior has a raised presbytery and a Baroque altar. The presbytery is separated from the rest of the hall by a round arch.

At the exit of the church, skirting the pool, there is a straight path. Continuing straight along the avenue, turn right around the pool and then right again. In this stretch of the





route, there are the houses of the village, for the most part built in the '500 by Rossellino, the same who following the admirable idea of Pius II built Pienza. The houses are mostly made of travertine, a local sedimentary limestone rock, which gives the village its characteristic appearance.

In this stretch the Palaces are reflected in the waters. Rossellino was a great architect and sculptor who continued the interpretation of Alberti, very active in these places and a key figure of the Florentine Renaissance tangible in sculpture but also in design architectural urban architecture characterized by order, harmony, proportion and beauty, typical themes of classical antiquity but reworked in a Renaissance key

Once you arrive at **Palazzo del Rossellino**, now home to the spa hotel, you can continue walking along the craft shops or turn left to return to the parking lot. The Rossellino Palace was originally the summer residence of Pope Pius II, it was the home of his descendants until 1968. The first and second floors are in travertine while the last is a recent elevation from the last post-war period.

From this side it is also possible to admire the façade of the Church and the ancient houses on the opposite side.

Accessibility:

The entrance to the Church has 2 steps 16 cm high. Beyond the entrance portal with two leaves of 43 cm width each and an external threshold step of about 4 cm and an internal one of about 2 cm, there is an internal door with two central leaves, with a width of more than 90 cm and 2 other side doors with a net opening of 70 cm.

At the exit of the church, skirting the pool, there is a straight path 15 meters long with a slope of 5%. On the other side of the square, however, the path is flat.

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Events

Among the most important events are:

- **Orcia Wine Festival** – April.

The event celebrates the wines of the DOC ORCIA. The festival officially opens in the iconic Piazza delle Sorgenti with tasting stalls and market exhibitions.

- **Tuscan musical landscapes** – August.

International Festival of Classical Music . Concerts with world-famous artists in the most evocative places of art, including the squares and gardens of Bagno Vignone.

- **Cinema under the stars** - June/ August.

Open-air film festival.

- **Val d'Orcia gravel** - October

Non-competitive cycling event for lovers of vintage bikes, gravel bikes and e-bikes. It takes place in the Piazza delle Sorgenti as a starting point for cyclists.

- **Book colors**

Literary review and book market exhibition that regularly hosts meetings with authors and cultural presentations between San Quirico and Bagno Vignoni

Accessible public places

In Bagno Vignone it is possible to have meals in many restaurants and taverns in the village in the outdoor spaces, equipped with tables and chairs.

At the time of the visit, most of the restaurants were closed to the public, so it was possible to visit only one restaurant that has some accessibility features:

- **La Madonna Restaurant – not equipped with accessible toilets, but with an entrance that has a small ramp and a small entrance step.**
